Mr L. RON HUBBARD, the American financier who was recently involved in the purchase of the Dumi Hills Hotel and in a number of other big business deals in Rhodesia, has been refused permission to stay in the country and has until next Monday to leave.

The founder of the controversial scientology movement, has been told by the "Ministry of immigration that his temporary ~~allowance's residence permit will not~~ be renewed, a spokesman for Mr. Hubbard said last night.

The spokesman said the permit expired next Monday and Mr. Hubbard expected to leave Rho-

Mr. Hubbard refused to comment last night. A ministry of Immigration spokesman also refused to comment.

Mr. Hubbard arrived in Rhodesia earlier this year after being told by his doctor to leave Britain following his third attack of pneumonia.
